Breastfeeding Buzz







World Breastfeeding Week (WBW) 2023's theme focuses on breastfeeding and employment/work because workplace challenges are the most common reason women do not breastfeed or stop earlier than recommended. The theme highlights the impact paid leave and workplace support can have along with emerging parenting norms on breastfeeding from the view of the parents themselves. Target audiences

include governments, policymakers, workplaces, communities, and parents. These target groups will be engaged to play their significant roles in empowering families and sustaining breastfeeding-friendly environments in work life following the pandemic. Every year since 2016, the World Alliance for Breastfeeding Action (WABA) has coordinated the World Breastfeeding Week as a global campaign to increase breastfeeding awareness and promote action on breastfeeding related themes. The 2023 objectives are: (1) Inform people about working parents' perspectives on breastfeeding and parents, (2) Anchor optimal paid leave and workplace support as important tools to enable breastfeeding, (3) Engage with individuals and organizations to enhance collaboration and support for breastfeeding at work, and (4) Galvanize action on improving working conditions and relevant support for breastfeeding.
